

THEY THINK IT'S ALL OVER...IT IS NOW

He was a rebel, or so they thought. He didn't think the way they did and seemed to contradict or criticise everything their culture and religion stood for. Who did he think he was? After all he was just another semi-skilled labourer from a backwater town – he wasn't important.

Yes, they'd seen him do some remarkable things – people who had been ill, blind or couldn't walk seemed to be healed and there were reports that even dead people came back to life again. But he mixed with all the wrong people, even with women from the red-light district, so he couldn't be trusted, could he? "He's not like us," they reasoned, "we're respectable – he most certainly isn't!"



The day that changed everything

But what really stuck in their throats was that he claimed to be God's son. How ridiculous! He was just another jumped up country boy who could hoodwink and deceive. These so-called miracles were just illusions, magic tricks he conjured up. He may have been an entertaining story-teller with his home-spun wisdom but all he really had was the ability to manipulate crowd dynamics for his own ends.



THE CASE FOR EASTER - Lee Strobel

When Lee Strobel's wife Leslie became a Christian, it turned his world upside down.

As an award-winning journalist on the Chicago Tribune, he was always passionate to get to the truth of a story.

Lee couldn't deny the winsome changes he was seeing in Leslie's character and values but, as an atheist, he believed that Christians were blinded by their faith from the real facts about Jesus.


Using his investigative skills and legal training, Lee set out to liberate Leslie from this "cult". He quickly identified three big questions, and they all took him to the heart of the Easter story:

- Was Jesus really dead after his ordeal on the cross?
- Was the tomb of Jesus actually empty on that first Easter morning?
- Did credible people actually encounter him afterwards?

In this gripping, but tiny, 90-page book, Lee Strobel digs deep into these questions, interviewing experts and leaving no obvious stone unturned.

Whether you are a person of faith or not, I think you will find some of his findings quite surprising – and Strobel leaves us to come to our own verdict. As someone who is not a great reader, I found this little gem of a book easy to read and utterly absorbing.

What better time of year to get to grips with the original Easter story?




NINE GO TO KIBERA

Kibera is the largest slum in Africa. The population is estimated to be between 250,000 and 1 million people. Most people live in a shack with mud / wood walls and a corrugated iron roof. The shacks are typically 12 foot x 10 foot, don't have running water or toilet facilities and less than half have electricity. Most people living in Kibera are described as living in extreme poverty. People work long hours often earning no more than a dollar a day and unemployment affects 50% of the population.

Our hosts, **Peter Abungu** and **Chris Ormondi** from the **Swahiba** team, together with **Jerry** our driver and the 9 younger members of staff couldn't have been more helpful or accommodating. After a straight through flight from Heathrow to Nairobi, it was a short drive to our hotel – which was clean, comfortable and the food perfectly acceptable and varied.



But we were there to work, to learn and to encourage.

On our first afternoon we were putting new shoes on some of the poorest children, the money for which had been kindly raised by CCW and other supporters back home.

First, we washed the children's feet just as Jesus had done for his disciples. In so doing, we were showing them that we

were there to serve. We dried their feet, put on the shoes, talked and prayed with them. We all found this a surprisingly moving experience. During our stay we were privileged to give **more than 150 children** their first pair of new shoes!

We had also raised money for **food parcels**, the contents of which were basic – maize flour, salt, sugar, oil, tea, washing soap, toothpaste etc. But to the recipients they were a 2 - 3 week lifeline and were received with real joy and thanksgiving. The Swahiba team had already identified those most in

need. We carried the food boxes through the slum to the individual's home and met their family. It was humbling to be invited into their home which typically housed 4 – 6 people. Some had no furniture at all, others just a battered sofa, a few wall coverings and perhaps a bed but there was warmth and dignity within the home. Their stories were truly heart-breaking. Many families had lost one or both parents and **often people had to decide between food and education**; one teenage boy lived alone in an area that was too dangerous for us to visit; another girl explained that she hadn't eaten for two days.



The Swahiba team do an amazing job. They run several projects all with a slightly different focus, but all underpinned by the gospel. They give so many young people hope and **equip them with skills** to help support themselves and others. These kids might be slum dwellers, but they are bright, and they all seem to have a hunger to get educated, to get qualified, to get a decent job. We joined in several of these projects, leading small group discussions on subjects such as self-esteem and peer pressure. We also went to an **orphanage** and a youth detention centre, telling

bible stories, teaching them songs, playing games. It was challenging work but great fun. And we learnt as much as the kids.

Church on Sunday was a bit different to CCW. It was a real privilege to be worshipping with Christians from a different continent with a completely different culture but who are every bit as loved and valued by God as we are.

Green and pleasant Woodbury seems a million miles away from slum Kibera but get to know the people and they are just the same as you or I. We just had the good fortune to be born in Britain.

The team may be back but our journey hasn't ended and there will be opportunities for others to walk with us in the future. And if you get a chance to go then take it! Visiting Kibera won't be like your usual beliday.






The Chinese church is known for its care for the marginalised in society. Recognising this, the Communist government has allowed Christians relative freedom in the last 15 years. In this time, churches have grown, Christians now numbering around 97 million and still growing. By contrast, Communist party membership has plateaued at 89 million.

In February 2018 new religious regulations were introduced which have increased pressure on Christians e.g. anyone under 18 is banned from attending church or receiving any religious education. How would we as a church deal with that?

In a couple of provinces, churches have been shut down. A dreadful situation but



one which has sometimes had positive consequences: some congregations have split into multiple smaller gatherings, one church is meeting in parks and handing out tracts, another city (church) group returned to their home

villages where they are now spreading the gospel and church planting!

The government is not yet completely stamping out religion. It sees the church as a useful arm for increasing citizen loyalty to President Xi Jinping's ideology; the aim being to make religion fit smoothly



with the Communist line.

There are plans to selectively reinterpret Christianity and the Bible to fit with Chinese culture. One official government-approved church was ordered to remove 'You shall have no other gods before me' from the Ten Commandments display on the front of the pulpit.

If religion is curbed so that the gospel is compromised, Christians are increasingly going to face hard choices (e.g. some students are being forced to renounce their faith or face consequences).

One pastor was imprisoned last December and his wife detained in a secret location. Their son, aged 11, now lives with his grandmother and both are under constant surveillance causing much stress. The pastor has written a letter saying, "Separate me from my wife and children, ruin my reputation, destroy my life and family - the authorities are capable of doing all these things - however, no one in this world can force me to renounce my faith."

Please remember them all in your prayers, knowing that God is able to do so much more than we ask or imagine (Ephesians 3:20).
